Report from Council at the Boston ACS National Meeting August, 2015

The ACS Council took a number of actions at the Council meeting in Boston (remarkably with all unanimous votes, except for the election). Specifically,

- By electronic ballot, the Council elected Mary K. (Moore) Engelman, Roland F. Hirsch,
 C. Marvin Lang, Les W. McQuire, and Donivan R. Porterfield for a 2016-2018 term on
 the Committee on Nominations and Elections.
- The Council voted to approve the Petition on Preferential Voting, contingent upon confirmation by the ACS Board of Directors.
- The Council voted to approve the Petition on Member Expulsion, contingent upon confirmation by the ACS Board of Directors.
- On the recommendation of the Committee on Nominations and Elections, the Council
 voted to approve the Balloting and Preferential Voting Procedures for Elections of
 President-Elect, District Directors, and Directors-at-Large, contingent upon approval of
 the Petition on Preferential Voting. These procedures will be posted on the ACS website
 following Board confirmation.
- On the recommendation of the Committee on Membership Affairs, the Council voted to approve the Procedure for Expulsion of a Member, contingent upon approval of the Petition on Member Expulsion. These procedures will be posted on the ACS website following Board confirmation.
- International Chemical Sciences Chapters: On the recommendation of the Committee on International Activities, Council voted to approve the establishment of the Australia, Brazil, Nigeria, Peru, and United Arab Emirates International Chemical Sciences Chapters, subject to confirmation by the Board of Directors.

Resolutions:

 The Council passed a resolution acknowledging President Diane Grob Schmidt's service as presiding officer of the Council and expressing gratitude for her 48 years of service to the Society. Congratulations, Diane!

Finally, numerous reports were presented orally. The written versions of these reports will appear in Chemical and Engineering News within the next few months.

Prizes: First place winner of each grade category will be invited to attend the ACS Awards presentation with guests held in April 2016 at Northern Kentucky University and be recognized for their accomplishment.

Winners of the Cincinnati, OH illustrated poem contest will advance to the ACS National Illustrated Poem Contest! National Contest Winners will be awarded \$300 for first place and \$150 for second place in each grade category.

Write and illustrate a poem using the NCW theme, "Chemistry Colors Our World". Your poem must be no more than 40 words, and in the following styles to be considered:

ODE · ABC POEM · FREE YERSE · END RHYME BLANK YERSE HAIKU . LIMERICK .

Participants are encouraged to explore topics related to:

- . Dyes and pigments
- · Absorbed and reflected light
- The chemistry of fireworks

Entries will be judged based upon:

- · Relevance to and incorporation of the theme
- · Word choice and imagery
- · Colorful artwork

- · Natural and artificial colors
- · Any other relevant topics
- · Adherence to poem style
- · Originality and creativity · Overall presentation

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Contest Rules:

- Poems must conform to a particular style. No poem may be longer than 40 words.
- . The topic of the poem and the illustration must be related to the NCW 2015 theme, "Chemistry Colors Our World".

 • All entries must be original works without aid from others
- Each poem must be submitted and illustrated on an unlined sheet of paper (of any type) not larger than 11" x 14". The illustration must be created by hand using crayons, watercolors, other types of paint,
- colored pencils or markers. The text of the poem should be easy to read colored pencils or markers. The text of the poem should be easy to read and may be printed with a computer, before the hand-drawn illustration is added, or the poem may be written on lined paper which is cut out and pasted onto the unlined paper with the illustration.

 Only one entry per student will be accepted.

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
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
